Saga of a Church

In 1972, my wife and I moved to Cebu City to begin a new ministry. We were leaving a twelve year ministry at the International Grace Bible Institute. We had been with the Institute since its beginning in 1958. It was time to move on as Filipinos were now in place as the Director and teachers.

We moved to Cebu City, the second largest city in the Philippines, to begin a ministry among the national churches and pastors in the central Philippines.

Cebu is a university city with many schools. I hadn't realized that there were a number of Things To Come Mission youth members who were studying in the local universities.

When some of them heard that I would be living in Cebu they came and asked me if I would have a Bible Class for them on Sunday when I was in town. I didn't want a responsibility which would tie me down on certain days because I wanted the freedom to visit churches and youth conferences. But how could I refuse such a request?

So we began teaching the young college students on Sundays in my home. After some time it was felt that more would come if we held the study in a Filipino's home so we moved the study to the home of one of the youth.

The class continued to grow until it was felt we needed to rent a place to meet so that the Bible study could become a church group. A place was rented and a pastor was called--Pastor Gerson Bermejo.

I believe this church could become a large Grace Church but with the unfinished building they will be held back.

We had to rent a place near a big Fish Market. In spite of the noise and smells the group grew with adults being added.

Then one Sunday Brother Edgar Tan stood up and said, "it is time for us to start a Church Building Fund." It took the church members and brothers here in the U.S. twelve years from that Sunday to finally buy a church lot. The thrill for us was to see the members supporting the Building pro-

gram. Many had to sacrifice to give as most were very low income people.

In 1986 the time came for Pauline and I to leave the Philippines and begin a new ministry with TCM. The only regret of leaving Cebu was that I would not be able to see the Building program completed. I felt assured, though, because they had their lot and could go ahead and start building.

In 1988 they began to build the church building. It has not been easy for them. They have had set backs—one main one was the tropical storm that blew off the new roof. This was a big financial loss and they struggled to replace it.

I have just returned from a trip that took me to the Philippines, Malaysia and Singapore. My first Sunday in the Philippines I was privileged to speak in the Cebu church and came away with mixed emotions. I was impressed because the Building program had made progress. They had the front, back and part of the sides finished of the two story building. The sadness came when I walked into the building. The floor was still dirt and the benches were falling apart (we built them nearly 20 years ago and they were still being used). The

wind and rain could also blow right through the church because the walls were not complete.

Pastor Pielago showed me their plan for cementing the floor. He made charts showing how much a meter of cement would cost and listed up through 10 meters. Members could then choose the number of meters they could pay for. A number of members had signed up.

I believe this church could become a large Grace Church. They have many good things going for them but with the unfinished building they will be held back.

Would you please pray that God will raise up \$5000 to help complete this building in order that the **Saga of this Church** will continue? I do believe if they could finish the walls, cement the floor, and build new benches they will have a nice building. These brothers love the Word of God rightly divided and have a good evangelistic program. Let's join them in prayer for this need. ©

First, the Good News:

Can you imagine volunteering to send a check each month to a missionary or mission field for one year? How about for 5 years? What about 10 or 20 years?

The writer has only been with the mission for 15 years yet there are over ten families and churches right now who are supporting me and have done so since I started. Imagine, a check each month for 15 years--180 checks.

Some of these donors have even increased the amount of their gifts helping to meet the needs of my being married, to accomplish more in the ministry, and to cope with rising costs. And what about those who have supported the mission since the beginning, 1958!

Along with these long-term volunteers, there are those who have just recently started supporting various facets within the mission work through prayer and finances. One letter said, "My wife and I will be supporting...\$50 per month."

Another note said they had "committed themselves to \$100 per month to help support the work....The check should ar-

rive in your hand around the first of each month." This is exciting! It is humbling to know of one individual who volunteers financial support each month for 26 different accounts (including some national accounts) with an average of \$42.00 per account. Praise God! Though not everyone could do this, it is great to know that someone who can, is.

Where would we be without these volunteer supporters? We wouldn't be where we are now--ministries in at least 8 countries, 37 missionaries, four Bible Institutes (plus at least 14 local training centers organized and administered by the local churches), over 500 national churches, thousands of people saved and taught the Word of God (1 Timothy 2.4), and hundreds trained as pastors and Christian workers.

We wouldn't have had missionaries travel literally around the world preaching the Gospel of Reconciliation through our Lord Jesus Christ.



But, now the Bad News:

Some volunteers are dying!

Just a couple of days ago we received notice through the post office informing us of the death of one of our volunteers. Who will take her place? She had been both a prayer and financial supporter. Who will begin praying to take up where she left off? Who will begin financial support to continue where she left off?

Another volunteer died about a year ago. After faithfully supporting the ministry of TCM for many years, she went to be with the Lord. She had included the mission in her will. What a blessing!

Some of the amount she left was used for the move of the office to Indianapolis. Some of it was used in the repair of the Bible Institute buildings in the Philippines. Some has been designated to help build a Bible school in Indonesia. But who will take her place in helping many ministries within the mission on a regular basis?

Some churches have had to close their doors! During the past three months we have received letters from at least two church groups who have supported the mission in the past. Both of these groups

have stopped meeting and informed the mission that they would no longer be able to financially support any ministries. One group sent an extra special gift from some of the assets the church had. That was helpful. One group wrote as follows: "This will be the last check....Due to lack of funds we have closed it out. This is the balance of the account." What will happen to the ministries they have been supporting?

Some volunteers are starting to live on "fixed income!"

Just this past month we received a letter from one who wrote, "Please discontinue my monthly gifts to the following:

Total to be discontinued--\$126.00. I will no doubt have to discontinue other gifts in the future, as the income...drops off. It is a heart-breaking decision to drop these men and/or ministries when I know how much they need the support. I am trusting the Lord to

take up where our gifts leave off and raise up others to meet these needs."

The month before this, another couple who had been giving \$200 a month for a number of years (beyond their gifts to the local church) had written that they would start to cut their gifts in half due to a lack of funds at that time. After a few months they would see if they could continue any gifts at all. A few years ago I received a copy of a letter from an individual who was supporting a number of ministries. She stated that some of the amounts would have to be cut in half as it was becoming more difficult for her to live on her fixed income in light of the rising prices.

Some volunteers are facing emergencies in their own lives! We received a letter from one family who had to cease their financial support due to a hail storm wiping out their entire crop. Being without insurance, they had lost almost \$50,000. Not only were they hurting, but the ministries they supported will also suffer.

There are some volunteers who doubt the mission's faithfulness to God's Word! A few years ago some of our

national workers had the opportunity to attend Amsterdam '86. This was sponsored by The Billy Graham Association and they paid the financial obligations of our people to attend. National Evangelists from the whole world attended to study evangelism and be encouraged by one another.

Some churches and pastors, who had been supporting the mission ministries, felt attendance was wrong (forgetting we train our workers to be "noble Bereans") and quit giving. This leaves another void in the support level and someone else must take up the slack.

WHERE ARE THE NEW VOLUNTEERS?

Not only are new volunteers needed to replace those who can not give so much any more, but new volunteers are needed to help the mission expand and reach out further and further. Sometimes living in the USA can result in a limited vision. Traveling overseas can open our eyes wide to the great potential and need. TCM hopes to continue to grow and be the tool God can use to reach new areas resulting in greater growth. But this can't be done without the help of many vol-

unteers. Pray for God to raise up new volunteers.

If you are not presently a volunteer in prayer and financial support, would you consider making a commitment to the Lord and TCM to volunteer for at least one year? If you are uncertain whom to support, write to the mission office for special prayer and financial needs. Maybe you are friends with one of our missionaries. Maybe you have had a missionary in your home. Maybe you have a burden for a specific country. Maybe your burden is the training of nationals in their own country to minister to their own people. Consider making a commitment to this individual, family, or country.

SET FREE MINISTRY

United States of America

The Set Free Ministry is located in Bradenton, Florida. It is a multi-phased program designed to help heal and restore hurting, lost and destitute people. Women Set Free focuses specifically on women caught in the grips of alcoholism, drugs, prostitution, crime and rebellion. Set Free Overcomers consists of Support/Recovery groups, counseling and after-care ministries.

PERSONNEL NEEDS FOR SET FREE

Retired Christian Couple or Single Woman

- Part-time volunteer for oversight of 3 homes with a total possible of 15 girls (housing provided).
- Could be short-term (6 months during winter).
- May include light Bible studies, office work, maintenance, collecting rent, financial counseling, transporting women to medical appointments.
- Need a "grandparent" type - will train on the job.

Two Full-time Workers

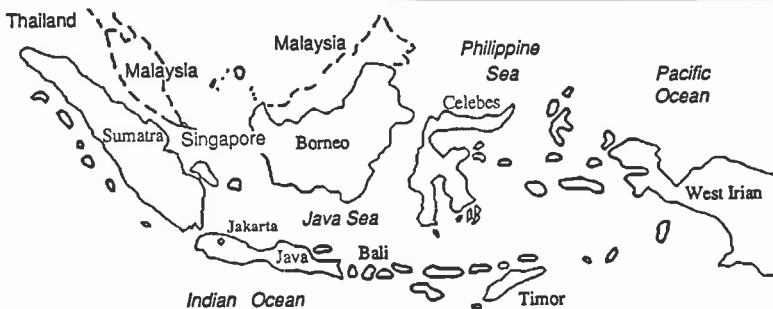
- Need to be single women or a married couple.
- A 3-6 month "Servants Training" and internship will be provided on the job.
- Need to be Christians with the gift of encouragement, but no specific schooling or degrees required.
- Ministry will include emotional and spiritual "reparenting" of women, one-on-one teaching, developing life skills, counseling.
- Terms are flexible, housing is available.

Full-time Administrator

- Male or female, can be short term.
- Includes accounting, bookkeeping, office management.

INDONESIA

Southeast Asia



Indonesia is a country of about 13,500 islands (one-fifth the size of the U.S.) but has the fifth largest world population. There are more than 60 ethnic groups, including Javanese, Sudanese, Madurese, and Malays. The majority of the people are Muslims (followers of the Islam religion). There is only about 5% Evangelical Christians and about the same for Hindus and Buddhists. Though a Muslim country, women (for the most part) don't wear veils and they have rights in property settlements. However, a man may have as many as four wives. About half the population live in poverty. Rice is the main staple and one should never use the left hand in passing food, pointing, shaking hands, or giving and receiving objects. Bahasa Indonesia is the official language (a form of Malay) but there are over 200 dialects spoken. Many of the older people still speak some Dutch.

PERSONNEL NEEDS IN INDONESIA

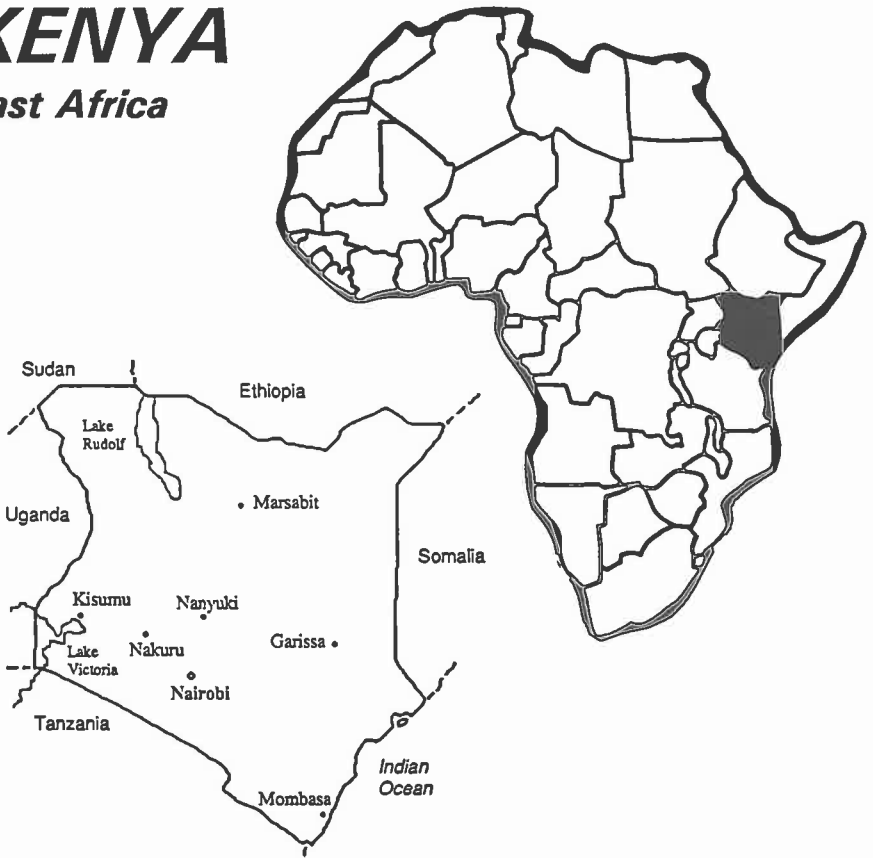
Bible Institute Teacher

- The Bible Institute is located in the capital city of Jakarta.
- Must demonstrate proficiency in Biblical and religious knowledge.
- A familiarization with the Muslim faith and religious practices would be of great benefit.
- Language study would be necessary to learn Bahasa Indonesia, the national language.
- Could also help with evangelism and church planting.



KENYA

East Africa



Kenya is a country of 24 million people located at the equator on the east coast of Africa. Independence from Britain was gained in 1963. The country saw good development in the beginning but growth has slowed drastically in recent years. Kenya is solidly a third world country. Poor education, food production and health care is the norm in rural areas. About 90% of the people are farmers. There is a very large poor class with a small middle class and an even smaller rich class. 1991 and 1992 have brought a constitutional change to multi-party democracy. So far, there have been no elections. Most of Kenya is at 4,000 to 6,000 feet above sea level. Temperatures are moderate with two rainy seasons and two dry seasons. English and Swahili are the common languages with many tribal languages, the biggest being Kikuyu.

PERSONNEL NEEDS IN KENYA

Bible School Teacher

- The teacher would be located in Embu, Kenya, a Provincial Headquarters with a population of 30,000. Grace Bible School is in its fourth year of operation with present enrolment of 14 students. The school uses a four year curriculum with the third year being spent in internship. All classes are taught in English, the language of education in Kenya.
- Minimum of two years of Bible School or equivalent Bible training.
- Experience in preaching and teaching.

Church Planting Missionaries (3 needed)

- There are three areas of Kenya where the work is growing and we need missionaries to assist the growth of churches and individuals. Each missionary would be responsible for a district about the size of an average county.
- Minimum of two years of Bible School, preferably with some course work in mission theology and practice.
- Pastoral or church leadership experience.
- Aptitude for language would be most helpful.
- Self-motivated, organized and patient! 😊



BRAZIL

South America



Brazil is the largest country in South America and the fifth largest in the world (it is larger in size than the continental United States). Over half of its land is covered by forest, the most being the tropical rain forest around the Amazon River, the world's largest river. In the south, the climate is more temperate but still hot and humid along the coast. The main language is Portuguese (which has some similarity to Spanish). Brazil is over 80% Roman Catholic and is a mixture of people of European, African and Indian descent. Over 65% of the people live in the cities. Though the middle class is growing, the inflation rate is reaching 300% and unemployment is around 25% making it difficult for families to survive. Agriculture, industry and service-related jobs are the main components of the economy. Their national sport is soccer and they take it very seriously.

PERSONNEL NEEDS IN BRAZIL

Bible Institute Teacher

- The teacher would be living near the large city of Curitiba, the Provincial capital of Parana. The Institute was started in 1988 and just graduated its first class of four students this past December. Five students are currently enrolled for this year.
- All classes are taught in Portuguese so language study would be a requirement.
- Must demonstrate proficiency in Biblical and religious knowledge.
- Could help with evangelism and church planting; musical talent would be a benefit but not necessary.

Assistant Youth Leader

- This person would train and prepare the youth for a life-time commitment to the Lord.
- Must take language training in Portuguese.

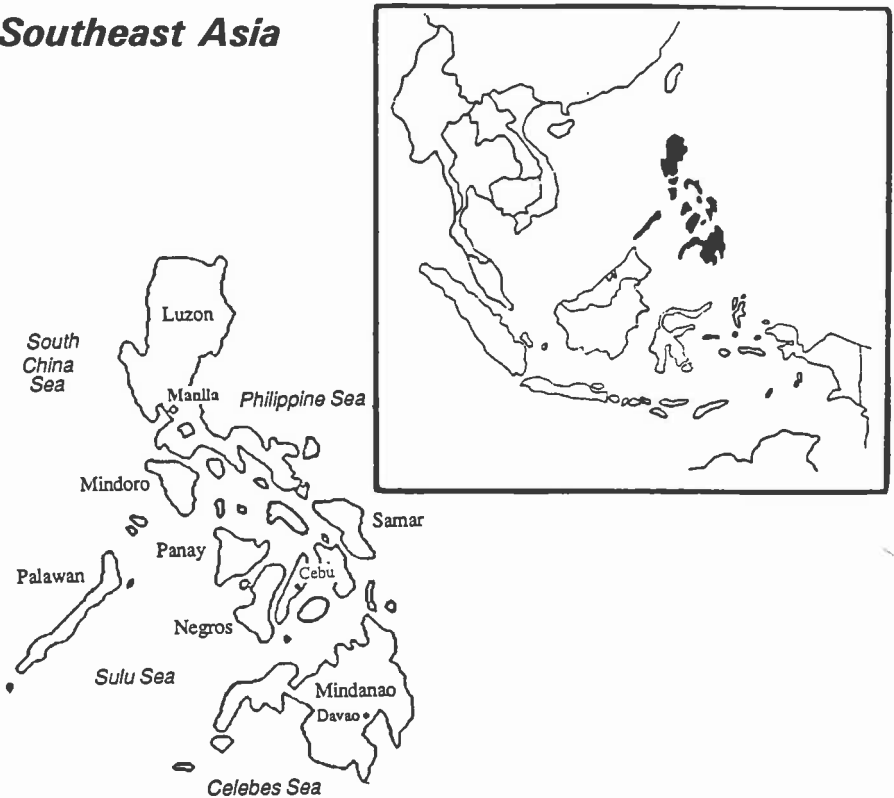
Evangelist and Church Planter

- Would travel to the present churches and outreaches and work with the pastors and youth leaders.
- Language study a definite necessity.



THE PHILIPPINES

Southeast Asia



The Philippines is comprised of 7,100 islands (which is close to the size of Arizona). However, the population is nearly 60 million making the density almost 390 people per square mile (only 58 in the U.S.). English is the main unifying language since there are 87 different dialects. It is the only Asian nation that is predominantly Christian: 85% of the people are Roman Catholic and another 10% are Protestant. Filipino women enjoy basic equality with men, working alongside their husbands in the fields or working in government, industry and business in the cities. They also usually manage the household and finances. Rice is the main food, along with fish, tropical fruits, and vegetables. Relationships are very important and confrontation must be done with a mediator so that someone does not "lose face." Education is highly valued and the literacy rate is 88%.

PERSONNEL NEEDS IN THE PHILIPPINES

Field Work Development

- This person would be located in Cagayan de Oro where the main office is. He would work to revive churches--concentrating on leadership training among the elders, support for pastors from the churches, church growth and any other aspects involved with the field work.
- Though English is used, it will be very beneficial to learn the main dialect.
- Must be able to teach, but does not necessarily have to be a deep theologian.
- Needs to be willing to work under the local leadership.
- Needs to have good people skills in communication and relationships.

Specialized Ministry Development

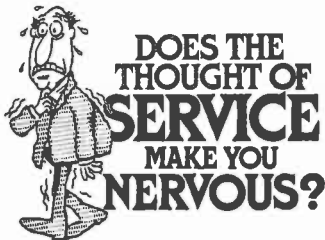
- This person could locate anywhere as long as he has ready access to necessary transportation means. He would concentrate on reviving the media ministries--literature, broadcasting (radio and TV). He would also work with other specialized ministries focusing on youth, adults, families, and financial development. Many of these areas could have a single person assigned to them but we may only be able to get one person to handle it all.
- Some familiarity and experience with the media and publishing would be helpful.
- Needs to have a vision for these types of ministry and be willing to raise money in the U.S. for these needs.
- Language training would be helpful but not necessary.

Theological Education Development

- This person would concentrate on the Bible Institutes and other full-time training institutions to help them develop their programs. He would focus on upgrading the level of education with the goal of eventually

establishing a Bible College level of training. He would also work on maintaining the facilities, upgrading the library, and screening faculty. When there are opportunities he would teach. Most practical locations would be Ozamis City, Tagum, or possibly Cagayan de Oro.

- Bible College graduate minimum, best if he had a Masters.
- Needs to have a commitment to quality education but not overly academic to be impractical for our situation.
- Must be able to work with strong, independent-minded national leaders.



NEWS YOU CAN USE . . . for prayer time

SANNY & JEANNETTE SUMILHIG continue to wait for the approval of their visa application. Recently they sent some information to the Brazilian Embassy but after a week or so, while following up on the application, the Embassy said the papers had been lost. Now they have to refile the papers, again delaying the approval. Please pray for the individuals in government who will be handling these papers so the process will go smoothly and the approval will be quickly granted.

VERNON & DARLENE ANDERSON have arrived in Brazil and are deeply involved in the work. They have had many meetings with the missionaries discussing problems and plans for the work. While teaching in the Bible Institute they will also be following up on their own visa application as well as that of Gomer & Urbana Indino and the Sumilhigs. Pray for them as they look for housing, transportation, and possibly a phone.

BRIAN SCHMITT and FRANK ULRICH continue their plans for ministry this summer in Kenya. Continue to pray for their visa approval and travel safety. **BEN ANDERSON** is preparing for their arrival and arranging a schedule for ministry while they are there.

Things To Come Mission believes it would be beneficial to the ministry if each field had its own phone and fax service. Many times it would be advantageous to be able to quickly share information from field to field or field to office. Please pray for this need. A phone line in Brazil and the Philippines would cost approximately \$2000 or more plus the cost of the fax machine. At this time we need:

I have to admit it, I'm a "fair weather" jogger. Even though Indianapolis doesn't receive very much snow during the winter, the cold gloomy winter mornings hold no inspiration or motivation for me to "get out and exercise." There's something about the bright sunlight, green grass and trees, singing birds, and busy squirrels and rabbits that beckons me to come out and enjoy God's creation on another new day. It's so much easier to remember to say "Good morning, Lord," and start my day with thoughts of Him when I am surrounded by His things, not my things.

One morning last week, as I came out of the house, I saw the neighbor's cat across the street sneaking up ever so slowly on some unseen creature in the flower garden. It was interesting to watch as it moved its foot an inch at a time and I decided to be "nice" and not disturb it. After all, the cat's affairs were no concern of mine. (I just hate to bother a cat and then have it give me either that condescending "thanks a lot" glare or the surprised look of shock as it turns and dashes away.) I didn't figure it would really catch anything when suddenly I heard a little squeal and I saw the cat prancing proudly away with a little rabbit in its mouth. And then I had mixed emotions. I thought I was doing the "right" thing by not disturbing anybody, but because I didn't get involved, another life was lost.

I think that happens a lot more in life than we realize! We don't want to "bother" people or interfere in their personal affairs—you know, be up front about believing in a personal, loving, holy and just God in the middle of this immoral, self-centered, anti-Christ world culture we live in. We are afraid we might get a response like, "it's none of your business; stay out of my life," and then we end up feeling guilty for thinking we could invade their right to live as they please. And yet if we don't find the courage to be bold and say something (in love), another life could be lost...for eternity. Isn't that thought worse than any negative response we might receive for at least trying?

My husband likes to use the example from Ezekiel 33 about the watchman. If the watchman sees danger coming and warns the people but they don't listen and end up dying in their sins, the watchman is not held responsible. He did his job and the people chose to ignore him. However, if the watchman sees the danger but says nothing about it and the people end up dying, the watchman will be held accountable.

This morning another rabbit was sitting in our lawn. That reminds me of the hope that even though I failed before, God will still continue to use me. But I pray that my eyes will be more sensitive to see people's needs and my heart more quick and willing to respond. © Jennifer Sidebottom
