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THE DIRECTOR SHARES

The changing world is reshaping the western-dominated, western-based, westerndirected missions. The major change in missions is the rise of nationalistic movements within many countries. These nationalistic movements are not only assuming more responsibility in reaching their countrymen with the gospel, they are also showing they can do a good job of reaching their people with the gospel of Grace.

According to a well-known mission researcher, at the close of 1990 approximately 49,000 non-western missionaries (nationals) were on the field, compared to 15,000 earlier. It seems if these figures are true, nationalistic the missionary movement is growing faster than the western missionary According to this reforce. searcher, the missionary force of non-westerners is coming from Korea, India, Brazil, Kenya, Zaire, Nigeria and the Philippines.

Most of these national missionaries never leave their own

country.
Instead,
they end
up min-



istering mostly in rural areas. The majority of these people work in isolated areas where there is no TV or radio and in rural villages that are hard to reach. I read that 80% of Asia's people still live in isolated, rural villages.

In 1957 TCM saw the importance of training nationals, not just from the practical standpoint, but from what the Bible teaches, especially the truth revealed to the greatest missionary outside of Christ, the apostle Paul.

I praise God for the truth that I was taught at Milwaukee Bible College (now Grace Bible College) about missions. The one truth that was emphasized over and over was that "a missionary should work himself out of a job." This can only be done through training national missionaries.

In 1958 we saw two basic needs of the national missionary-funding and training.

Therefore, in the Philippines, International Grace Bible Institute was established in 1959 to meet the lack of Biblical training. To meet the financial need we began partially supporting some of those who were called of God to reach their own people with the message of Grace. At that time it was not a popular position to support national missionaries. There was a saying, "you will make rice Christians if you help them financially." In other words, they will only preach or teach because they are paid. We rejected this position because the Word of God teaches that the Body of Christ is one unit made up of many members. Each member is to help other members. We also see Paul helping those that ministered with him (Acts 20.34).

This same principle was followed in Indonesia, Brazil and Kenya. Today, in the Philippines, there are around 450 national churches and one Bible Institute with two campuses training 135 students preparing for various Christian ministries. There are five Filipinos and one Indonesian ministering in Brazil, Kenya and Indonesia with TCM.

TCM's ministry in the Philippines and Indonesia is 95% under the leadership of non-western missionaries.

TCM is still praying that Brazil will grant visas for another Filipino couple from the Philippines (Gomer and Urbana Indino) to join the work in Brazil. We are also praying for funds to get Gomer and Urbana from the Philippines to Brazil and for their monthly support. Maybe you could help provide this need.

Brethren, I would like very much to expand the training and the sending out of nationals in the Philippines, Indonesia, Brazil, Kenya and Malaysia. To do this, we need prayer and funds. Would you first please pray for these needs? Then if the Lord leads you to give to help support a national you can send your gift to the TCM office for that purpose. gift will be given 100% to the support of a national Pastor, Bible Institute teacher, Christian Education worker, Youth Director or national missionary.

PROJECT ABBA A Ministry for Needy Children in Brazil

To Michelle LeFeber, daughter of missionaries Doug and Vicki LeFeber, growing up on the mission field was a privilege. She was able to watch and learn from her parents as they have lived and served in Brazil. And through her experience, she has come to realize



that God is calling her to be in full-time ministry with TCM also.

The burden that God has put on her heart is for the children. Due to widespread poverty, there are more than seven million abandoned kids wandering through the streets of Brazil. Not only are there many abandoned children, but also millions who lack education, proper nutrition, health care, leisure, and other basic needs.

Michelle is personally committed to investing her life and abilities to provide as much as possible for these children--not only for their spiritual needs, but for their physical, emotional, and intellectual needs, also. Because she already knows the culture and language, it will allow her to have a greater effectiveness in establishing relationships and working with the people. Through a ministry like this, many families and communities will have the opportunity to hear about the message of the Grace of God.

The work of TCM in Recife, Brazil, is expanding. The plan is that Michelle will work along with her parents and other missionaries in the church on a full-time basis, focusing on the personal needs of the community surrounding their new church which is in an economically disadvantaged neighborhood. Her goal is to establish *Project ABBA* (abba means "father" in Aramaic-Romans 8.15), a Christian day care center which will be an extension ministry of the local Grace church, to provide for as many needy kids as possible.

She would like to ask you to consider the possibility of joining her in this ministry through your prayers and financial support. THE SOUTH AFRICAN MISSION ENDEAVOR CONTINUES...

In the Fall issue of the Inter-national Harvest, you read of the plan and desire of the Wishart family to go to South Africa this year from May through August as official representatives of Things To Come Mission.

The main purpose of this current article is to update you on our progress.

We have filed for the needed passports and visas.

It has been confirmed that I will:

- be working with the Zulu and Xhosa pastors.
- be working with Xhosa students at the Berean Bible Academy in Port Elizabeth.
- ✓ be the guest speaker at the July 1993 Bible Conference of the Berean Churches of South Africa.
- ✓ visit the new churches that have been established and will do leadership training with the Berean pastors.

We have begun to raise financial support in South

Africa, in the U.S., and in the local church that I pastor (the Berean Grace Fellowship of Grafton, Ohio).

The teachers of our children, both current and next year's, have asked our children to keep personal journals of their stay in South Africa so that next Fall they can give a report to their classes. This could turn out to be a wonderful opportunity for our children to share the gospel with about thirty classmates in each of their grades (3rd, 4th and 6th) plus their teachers and the principal.

Who would have thought that the South African Mission Endeavor would touch our elementary school? It looks like it will!

I have also been able to visit three churches thus far to share the slides from my trip to South Africa in November of 1991. I am hoping to visit other churches to show these slides and hopefully raise needed funds.

Well, friends of Missions, this updates you to this point in time. We continue to ask your prayer support in regard to these matters--

- 1) The continuing preparation for our journey to South Africa;
- The work of God in our children so that they can report to their elementary school the work of God in South Africa and their lives;
- 3) That our financial needs would be met--we have \$1,500 but still need to raise around \$7,500 more to cover airfare (our tickets need to be purchased by April 15) and the expenses for our three month stay;
- 4) That the Lord will prepare all the people in South Africa for our endeavors so that we might have a rich harvest for the Lord Jesus Christ through the Gospel of the Grace of God.

We sincerely thank you for your gracious support. We pledge to you our faithfulness so that there will be fruitfulness in South Africa and there will be no disappointment in your sacrifices to this TCM endeavor for the Glory of God.

Many of TCM's missionaries have no home to live in when they return to America on furlough from service overseas. Most missionaries, if they had a home, sold it before going to the field. If they were renting, they gave it up when they left. This means that when they come back on furlough, they have to stay with family or friends, or rent a place just for the time they are home.

Living with another family, even if they are relatives, means that they will not have the privacy they need to unwind after having spent three years in a foreign culture dealing with the stress of adjustment and having little or no privacy. A missionary's life is quite open on the field. They need time alone here in the States.

How can you help the missionary who is home on furlough?

If you have a rental unit-house, apartment or condoand are economically able to accept a tax receipt for a donation in place of the rent you would receive, then you definitely CAN help.

Most of our missionaries are home on furlough for one year after having spent three years on the field so they would only need a place to live for that year here in the U.S. If this is something you feel could do for the Lord, please contact us at the TCM office. We need to plan well in advance for a missionary family to be home on furlough so we need plenty of notice from you as to when the Missionary Home will be available.

We would also need specific information about size, location and any other limitations that might apply.

TCM thanks you for your concern for our missionaries. We know full well that it is because of people like you across America that TCM is what it is today. You are as much a part of the TCM family as the missionaries on the field for without you they could not be there. ©



Nearly every mission-ary home on furlough or who is required to be in the U.S. for a period of time needs to budget a S substantial amount of time and monev travel. Quite often missionaries have to ride on buses. planes or trains, or else depend on individuals and friends to drive them around from place to place. It can really limit the number of people seen or places visited in the short amount of time they may have.

Perhaps you could help out in this area. Maybe you can make it easier for the missionaries to minister in churches, colleges, and other places as well as visit with family, friends, and supporters. Do you happen to have a car you aren't using that much anymore or at least temporarily? Would

you consider loaning it or donating it to TCM for use by missionaries?

How good does this car have to be? If it is good enough for your daughter to use while away at college and you would trust her to be safe in it, then it would be perfect for missionary use. Most of our TCM missionaries travel 15-20,000 miles while home on furlough for one year. If your car can handle traveling that distance, it would be great for one of our missionary families to use.

How do you go about getting your car into missionary service? It's easy. Just call or write and let us know the necessary information and when it would be available. You can donate your car to the mission or designate it for a specific missionary or family to use if you would like. Either way, a tax-deductible receipt will be given.

Again, our thanks to you! We know that missionaries depend on friends like YOU who are committed to sharing the love and grace of God with the world!

IRREPLACEABLE MEMORIES

Hello...or Sambo as they say in Kenya, Africa. That's where I spent four weeks of July serving the Lord. I accompanied Brian Schmitt as a summer missionary to Embu, Kenya. We went as observers of the work of Ben Anderson and his family. At first, landing in such a foreign land, I was overcome by paranoia and fear. But it left at the same time as my jetlag. I spent the first two days getting to know the Kinkeads, Jessie Easterly, and the Andersons, including their daughters, Tegwen, Frances and Jaclyn. All of them are special people. Please keep them continually in your prayers.

The first week was spent in Mianya, a village in the center of rice patties. We held a conference of several churches there to become members of Grace Bible Church. Ben came across problems with traditions and doctrine such as polygamy, healing, etc. But many of the pastors came to a higher understanding of God's Word and Christianity, and overall it was time well spent.

The second week was

made up of many aspects of missionary life. Monday was a day to witness a malaria victim's funeral, one of many that occur in Africa. Tuesday was spent at a Swedish-built swimming pool complex. It was a pleasant reward. Wednesday and Thursday brought some manual labor as we cemented a whole church floor. Although the process was a little primitive compared to American ways, I enjoyed the experience. The weekend was time for evangelism as Brian and I met Samuel Mwangi and Jenaru and visited residents of Meru and gave our testimonies.

The third week brought on more work as we bricked up a wall and installed doors and windows in the first Grace Bible Church the Andersons established. We then spent the remainder of the week holding the Muchakos Youth Conference. A large amount of kids from the area came together to compete in Bible quizzing and memorization. Even though we offered prizes, the youth seemed to enjoy just the self-satisfaction of

knowing God's Word. It was very encouraging and uplifting to see someone putting time into helping the younger generation come close(r) to Christ.

My final week I went shopping with Joyce Anderson and animal sight-seeing with just the guys.

What I experienced and learned during my time in Kenya is more than what I've learned my whole life so far. I encourage, advise and plead for everyone to go on a mission trip. I love and miss the Kenyans I met and the memories will never be replaced. Ben Anderson and his family, through their hospitality, showed what it truly means to be a Christian. I learned a life-long lesson of patience and flexibility that can and must be applied to everyday life. Because of my journey, missionary trips aren't just a summer thing to me any more. As a Christian, our mission is not geographical, but measured by time-our life time. The only questions I ask God now is how and where to invest mine. I praise and thank my Lord Jesus Christ for taking me in, and out, of Africa. ©

REACHING OUT TO SUMATRA

Since years ago, the TCM work in Indonesia has been trying to reach Sumatra, one of the five biggest islands in Indonesia. In the late 70's, there were two young girls, Leika Kalangi and Angela Hamp (now known as Mrs. "Ella" Indino, a missionary to Brazil with her husband, Mario), who left Manado for Palembang, South Sumatra Province. But at that time the work in Jakarta needed help so they ended up stopping and ministered for the Lord in that city instead of going to Sumatra. Again, about six years later, Deny Weku went to Medan, the capital city of North Sumatra Province, but he only spent two days in that area and then returned to Manado.

We continuously pray for this area while working with the literature ministry. Many people have been reached with gospel tracts, Bible Correspondence Courses, and the "Grace Bulletin" (PESAN). Some of them have written to us asking for workers to help them grow in faith and the knowledge of the word of God. Mr. Edirosa Tampubolon, our former worker in Nganjuk, East Java, and Mr.

A.M. Manik, a Salvation Army officer who came to know dispensational Bible truth through the ministry of Mr. Vernon Anderson in Manado several years ago, are also in the North Sumatra area now. They are willing to help and cooperate with us if we could send one or two workers to Medan.

At the end of the GAA (Indonesian Grace Bible Church) National Conference in Ujung Pandang last year, it was decided to assign one worker to Medan this year. A young man has left everything behind in his home town of Kotamobagu, North Sulawesi. He is Mr. James Damping, a graduate in Music Education who has been serving the Lord during the past 10 years both in Kotamobagu and Manado. He helped Pastor Jerry Maloring in Ujung Pandang for two months after last year's conference.

We really need your prayer and support for James as he goes to Medan and starts the work on February 20 along with those friends in the area. Also, please pray for his fiancée, Miss Sherly Duran who will be finish-

Reflections Reflections Reflections Reflections

It is exciting to know that if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation! God "reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation" (2 Cor. 5.17-18). Being a missionary is a specialization of that ministry-reaching out to people who are "not of our own" (culture, language, background, whatever). But we can't forget that God expects us <u>all</u> to be ministers of reconciliation and involved in ministry, whether overseas or between seas.

What, then, are some basic qualities needed in order to minister effectively? I think Christ's example gives us a clue--he came not to be served but to serve. First of all, we need to have a servant's heart. Philippians 2.3-4 tells us to consider other people instead of just ourselves. It doesn't mean to deny the fact we have needs but, as Christians, we can entrust our needs to God so we are freed up to be available for others in need.

Secondly, we need that rare quality of commitment. In the realm of ministry, our goal should be spiritual growth—to see people come to know the Lord as their Savior and to grow up spiritually. However, sometimes we may focus more on outward talk and behavior and think nothing is happening on the inside. We can get discouraged and want to give up. But Philippians 1.6 is a great promise—we are confident that He who began the work will complete it! Our responsibility is to remain faithful—don't quit!

Finally, we must realize that there is no way we can really do the first two parts without being totally dependent on God. Many times we find ourselves wrestling with selfishness and the desire to quit and the only way we can still minister is to let God do it through us. Paul says, "when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Cor. 12.7-10). It doesn't mean when I am weak I will somehow feel strong. I will still feel weak but, putting my faith in God who is in me, He is strong! Therefore, when we experience "thorns" in our flesh that weaken or limit us in some way, they become opportunities to give our faith a chance to grow and be purified which will result in praise, glory and honor to the Lord Jesus Christ (1 Pet. 1.6-7).

The real key to being completely dependent on God is prayer—talking and spending time with Him—both alone and together with other believers. This we are commanded to do in Ephesians 6.18—pray on ALL occasions with ALL kinds of prayers, ALWAYS, for ALL the saints! I've come to realize that there is a two-fold benefit in praying with fellow Christians—results and relationships. Not only are we looking for answers within God's will, it also brings us closer to God and to each other. It is more difficult to be mad and upset with people when you have to pray with them and for them. God knew what we needed most. Let's encourage each other on in the "ministry" He has given to all of us!
