Lessons from the Philippines

A common question in relation to the Golden Anniversary celebration is, What caused the Philippine TCM churches to have such strong growth? A valid follow-up question: Is there anything that Grace churches in other countries can emulate to produce the same kind of growth? Valuable lessons can be learned, and applied contextually to churches in other countries.

A Team of Dedicated Christians

God has ordained that his ministry will be carried out by humans. The knowledge, skill, integrity and spirituality of those chosen individuals will have a direct bearing on the fruit they produce. TCM-Philippines has been blessed with an abundance of godly leaders-men and women, Filipinos and Americans-who have given their lives to accomplish God's purposes for the Philippines. The Andersons and Watkins, pioneer missionaries, were challenged for missionary service through the five missionaries speared to death by the Auca Indians in 1956. They, in turn, each have a child buried in Ozamiz City. "Is your all on the altar of sacrifice laid?"

Dedication must go beyond devotion to God himself. It must extend to God's people. The early pastors and missionaries registered an organization called *Things to Come Mission, Inc.* in the Philippines. They committed themselves to working together under that one organization. Thousands of people cooperating within one leadership structure gives tremendous benefits, such as Bible schools, building projects, church discipline, ministry focus, encouragement and church planting.

God's Timing

Church growth is often driven by the historical events taking place within a country. Ultimately, Jesus Christ is the Savior and people will only come to him if they sense that they need a savior. For centuries the Philippines was controlled by the Spanish and their Roman Catholic religion. During World War II, they were overrun by Japan-and subsequently suffered through a horrific three-year occupation which included the Bataan Death March. In 1942 General MacArthur said, "I shall return," and in 1944-1945 he led the U.S. armed forces in driving the Japanese out of the Philippines. On July 4, 1946, the Philippines was granted independence by the United States. Because of these events, American missionaries were welcomed and given an attentive ear. The Filipinos relished their political freedom and the gospel of grace met their need for spiritual freedom from the church laws which could only

Church growth always has a spiritual chronology which does not fit any human formula. Apostle Paul said, "I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow" (1 Cor. 3:6). Unfortunately, this concept is used as an excuse to ignore evangelism while waiting for God to act. Note that Step 1 and Step 2 are the responsibility of humans while only Step 3 is God's. The question is, are we ready to plant when and where God calls us to plant? Cambodia, for example, is rapidly opening up as the next Philippines. Who is ready to plant and water?

Focus on Training

International Grace Bible Institute opened within one year of the missionaries' arrival in the Philippines. By then, trained pastors were desperately needed for the 12 young churches. Jesus spent much time training disciples for the time when they would minister without his physical presence. When he sent out 72 disciples in Luke 10, each disciple had been trained with the message and method of his Master. The Pharisees addressed Jesus, *Teacher*, indicating his

most obvious role. Paul, following in the footsteps of the Master, spent much time training others. He expected the same from his trainees, as in his instruction to Timothy, "And the things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others" (2 Tim. 2:2). The rich blessings of the Word of God must be transmitted through the generations by a purposeful emphasis on training others, whether formally in a Bible school or informally through mentoring relationships.

Vision for Church Growth

In the Philippines, church growth is not optional. To be Pauline is to actively participate in evangelism and church planting. One of the basic truths I learned in Introduction to Church Growth in seminary was that church growth must be planned. Hoping and praying for growth must always be followed up with a pragmatic strategy for growth. The Philippine loaders have always kept a goal for growth before the churches. Director Jun Pielago's article states the goals of the Philippine Grace churches. He repeats these goals in every meeting. Paul wanted his area of ministry to expand. We must desire the same.

The Message of Grace

I end with perhaps the greatest lesson from the Philippine churches—the Grace message, that mystery revealed to Paul that Gentiles can now be saved by the grace of God through faith in Jesus without the instrumentality of Israel. This message has been the rallying cry of the Philippine churches for the past 50 years—giving them unity and purpose. The theme of the conference was Preaching Continuously the Mystery.

Over the past 50 years, literally hundreds of thousands of dollars have been invested in the Philippines by TCM and our faithful supporters. Every day the Body of Christ is reaping the rewards of the funds and effort which have been invested. Thank you, our readers, prayer warriors and supporters for making the Golden Anniversary such a blessing. I wish every one of you could have been there. My prayer is that this special edition of the *International Harvest* will give you a taste of what it was like.

TO ALMIGHTY GOD

"Welcome to our 50th TCM Anniversary Celebration!" This powerful, reverberating announcement signaled the colorful opening ceremonies of the four day Celebration held in Ozamiz City, April 22-26. Pioneer missionaries cut the ceremonial ribbon making way for the guests and participants to march in to find their designated places at the decorated platform in the

huge anniversary auditorium. Pastor Charley Young, President, Grace Ministries International, a main anniversary speaker, wrote this candid observation: "Things are going well here at the conference in Ozamiz. It is overwhelming to see the extent of the work here and a blessing to see the honor being given to the pioneer missionaries and the glory being given to God. Over 1,500 delegates were in attendance at the opening ceremony including five minutes of fireworks! It was really some production!"

Officially registered delegates totaled 1,235! Pastors, workers, missionaries-609; men-130; women-148; young people-311; foreign visitors-37. Over 300 visitors faithfully joined the nightly worship services and special features, all well-prepared musical renditions from various groups representing TCM ministries across the country. The 48 foreign visitors, plus Filipino missionaries, represented Australia,

Brazil, China, United Kingdom, South Africa, Kenya, Uganda, Indonesia, Cambodia, Australia, and USA.

The motorcade on the day before the conference paraded with trucks,

buses, vans, cars, jeeps, and motorcycles, colorful streamers and banners of various delegations; flags of participating countries proudly waved behind traffic police who escorted the spectacular activity through the city.

EXECOM was formally organized in 2006, responsible for planning, leading, organizing and coordinating all pre, on-site, and post-conference activities. A "kick-off" ceremony met at the 2007 National Conference in Bacolod City for 410 delegates who returned to their homes and churches with an Anniversary-saturated and ignited spirit which produced the unprecedented overflowing attendance. The 50th Anniversary will be recorded in the pages of TCM's history as one of the most awaited, longremembered, and prayer-saturated memorable occasions!

Distinguished foreign speakers included Paul M. Sadler, President, Berean Bible Society; Frosty Hansen, President, Grace Gospel Fellowship; Charley Young, President, Grace Ministries International; Joel McGarvey, President, TCM-USA; Ben Anderson, Exec. Director, TCM-USA; and pioneer missionaries Vernon Anderson and Joseph Watkins.

TCM family and friends rejoice before God. After 50 years existence in the Philippines, latest reports show: 431 Grace churches spread over 17 regions with an average membership of 58 individuals each; 65 pioneering areas being prayed to become organized local congregations before 2010. Pastors, Bible women, and teachers who are actively working either assigned or voluntarily under various departments are 407. Supervising Ministers watch over 31 ministry districts; seven strong departments are directed by dedicated Filipino leaders; nine men make up the Board of Trustees. Four resident Bible schools train an average of 165 students every year; 12 field Bible schools train men and women for local church leadership. These all are milestones the Lord has blessed so far; they are significant factors which help maintain the common ministry goals of TCM, whose Vision-Mission Statement is: "Things to Come Mission, Inc. endeavors to follow the global ministry concerns of the Apostle Paul as he follows Christ..It envisions to establish a Grace church in every municipality and city in the Philippines, and commits itself to win the lost; edify the saints; plant reproducing Grace churches; and produce committed believers in the teachings of grace whose lives are Christ-like in character." 🌣

The latest survey shows more than 400 churches which means between 8 and 10 churches are being planted every year: a very encouraging growth rate. It is my prayer that we in Kenya-in Africa at large-can emulate the Filipinos' strategies of church growth. O





In the April 2005 edition of The Berean Searchlight, Pastor Ricky Kurth noted the lack of available grace reference materials for Filipino pastors:

"I'm sure that I speak for grace pastors and Bible teachers everywhere when I say that I cannot imagine how difficult my teaching ministry would have been without the solid foundation provided by these precious volumes. Yet such is the challenge faced by hundreds of grace pastors in the Philippines. Not only do some of these diligent workers lack basic reference books \dots often their bookshelves are also bereft of some of the basic dispensational literature penned by the pioneers of the grace movement."

The "TOOLS" ministry represents our attempt to meet this need. With heavily discounted books from Berean Bible Society, Grace Publications, and Parson's Publishing, along with free resources from Grace Bible

Church in Fort Worth-we have created a 33-volume library of key grace reference books along with a few general reference works such as a concordance and Bible dictionary. Vernon and Darlene Anderson at TCM help with boxing and mailing, enabling these reference materials to be sent out to any overseas, English-speaking grace pastor who requests the literature and provides a testimony of his own

The TOOLS library is divided into three parts. To date almost 200 sets of the first installment of the library have been delivered to pastors in Southeast

Asia, Africa, Brazil and England. At the recent 50th Anniversary of TCM Philippines, nearly 150 copies of the second installment of the library were delivered to extremely appreciative pastors.

The apostle Paul admonished his son in the faith, Timothy: "And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2). Our objective for TOOLS for GOD'S WORKMEN is providing Biblical reference tools for willing workers. 🌣

Women and men were busy cooking for hundreds of people, setting up places to eat, and continually washing dishes so more people could eat. Sister Deb Pielago was one of many people working long and hard each day—all the while sick with fever.

Despite the discomfort of traveling far, sleeping in difficult circumstances and working hard, these people really wanted to be at this conference. I think their joy of seeing one another and celebrating how the Lord has worked in people's lives and established many churches and Bible schools made it all worth it.

There were hundreds of people to meet and it was a joy to put faces with the names of people I knew of and prayed for. Pastor Cadeliña, who has worked with the youth across the Philippines with tremendous fervor for 29 years, passed the responsibility of National Youth Director to Pastor Joed Amlon. Pastor Noel Maquiling traveled with five youth from his church to the conference on two motorcycles for eleven hours. His wife, Annabel Maquiling, who underwent open-heart surgery last year, is strong and radiant. In all instances I started off by sharing with them about our visit to the Philippines with the phrase: "What an inspiration!" It has been given a new meaning in all those talks.

What an inspiration it was to be among so many Grace Believers. To meet fellowbelievers one has never known, and those one has not seen in years, besides standing

out because of color and physical body features but knowing you are spiritually one! To fellowship and worship God with people of the same mind as oneself. But I guess most inspiring was to see what God has accomplished using two individuals and their families to change so many lives. Each message I listened to or heard of through others touched me deeply, and I



can say the same for my wife Linah. Since our return we spent many hours reflecting on this journey as to what was the Lord's purpose for us in it. Seeing what has been accomplished in the Philippines suddenly opened our spiritual eyes: What can be accomplished in South Africa? We have always had a deep passion for the work of the Lord, yet after many years of labor with 'minimal success' one does get weary!

Thanks to God for this awakening! We can never thank the Lord enough-not only for what He has done in the Philippines, but for what HE now continues to do round the world through the Filipinos. And also for affording all of us who were there an opportunity to witness this wonderful work. It has been by far one of the most inspiring things in my and my wife's lives as Grace believers. 🌣

HOSPITALI

T've arrived back in Indianapolis, unpacked my suitcase, and turned in my car, which must mean I am "home"... at least until July 14 when I fly off to my other "home" in Turkey. What amazes me is how very "at home" I have felt throughout this year-despite traveling through 30 different states and sleeping in 97 different beds! I have been so richly blessed by the hospitality extended to me by both old friends and new!

What does hospitality mean? Webster defines it: "The act or practice of receiving and entertaining strangers or guests without reward, or with kind and generous liberality." Although hospitality is not a common sermon topic, Paul told the Roman believers to be "given to hospitality" (Rom. 12:13). He also instructed Timothy and Titus that hospitality should be characteristic of a bishop or overseer of the church. When Peter wrote to believers about loving one another, he admonished them to

"show hospitality to one another without grudging or grumbling" (1 Pet. 4:9).

What does hospitality look like? As I reflect on this year, "hospitality" evokes cherished memories of people who opened their homes for me to spend the night, whether that meant sleeping on the couch in a studio apartment, or in a queen-sized bed in an elegant villa. I think of people who took me out for dinner at a favorite restaurant or invited me for a homecooked meal (even if they'd "never had a missionary over before" and felt quite anxious about that-hopefully it was a sufficiently non-threatening experience that they'll risk trying it again)! I think of people who took time off work in order to spend time with me, or who took me with




them to work and introduced me to their world. I think of people who toured me around special places, and people who included me in their family activities. I think of people showing me such extra kindnesses as turning down my sheets at night, leaving chocolates on my pillow or filling my car with gas. In every memory, what I think of most is conversations: people sharing their hearts and listening to my heart.

By sad contrast, a friend wrote recently, "I feel so useless and unimportant here. At a church service the other morning I lingered around the coffee machine to see if anyone would bother to talk to me. Several people did manage to give me a passing hello, but otherwise I was totally ignored-sort of like 'the Invisible Man."

Ultimately hospitality is about people making other people feel "at home." The Biblical word and its roots mean: to be friendly to one, to wish him well; to associate familiarly with one; a companion; one who receives and entertains another hospitably-one with whom he stays or lodges, a host (Thayer's Greek Definitions). What a precious gift hospitality is! I feel so privileged and deeply grateful for the hospitality people have lavished on me! 🌣






SOUTHEAST ASIA PHILIPPINES
